Program Description

The Wisconsin Population Health Service Fellowship is a two-year service and training program designed for masters prepared individuals, in public health and allied sciences. Candidates with doctoral degrees may also apply.

The two-year program provides applicants with practical field assignments in community-based, governmental, non-profit and health service organizations. The goal of the Service Fellowship is to provide service to communities while developing the next generation of public health practitioners skilled in planning, implementing, and evaluating public health programs.

At the heart of the program is a commitment to public service. Fellows receive hands-on training in organizations working on relevant and timely public health issues. By the end of the two-year period, Fellows will complete a series of core activities of learning that document the research and practice experiences of the Fellow.

In partnership with the Wisconsin Department of Health Services and the City of Milwaukee Health Department, the program provides placements within these two academic health departments, in addition to regional health departments and community organizations. Community placement sites have included: the March of Dimes, the American Cancer Society, Planned Parenthood, the Task Force on Family Violence and the Center for Resilient Cities. Placements are for two years and are based on the interests and needs of Fellows and agencies.

The Service Fellowship, part of the University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute, is funded by the Wisconsin Partnership Program for a Healthy Future. Fellowship Focus

Service and training are at the heart of the Service Fellowship. Throughout their two year placements, Fellows strengthen and apply knowledge, sharpen skills and develop strong networks with other public health professionals.

Fellows' training is organized around a set of core activities of learning that encourage skill-building in areas such as program development and evaluation, needs assessment, policy analysis, oral presentation and writing for publication. These core activities of learning demonstrate the diverse skills that will prepare Fellows for successful careers in public health.

Fellows have contributed to public health in Wisconsin through a wide range of activities, including:

- Implementation of a sexual education curriculum in Milwaukee public schools;
- a community-led wellness initiative in the Allied neighborhood of Madison;
- the identification of savings and development of new standards for quality care in the Medicaid program;
- implementation of a program to reduce commercial tobacco use among tribal communities in northern Wisconsin;
- creation of an innovative curriculum for a team of health promoters addressing chronic disease and other health priorities in the Latino community in Milwaukee;
- collaboration among hospital systems in Milwaukee to improve screening and identification of intimate partner violence.
