ABOUT THE NYC DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH VPCS

The New York City DOHMH's Veterinary and Pest Control Services (VPCS) protects the public from animal/vector borne diseases (e.g., West Nile Virus, Lyme's Disease, etc.) animal hazards and nuisances (dog bites, raccoon rabies, etc.) and city rodent infestations.

ABOUT THE PROJECT

The VPCS division of the Department of Health protects the public from rabies outbreak, uncontrolled strays and dog attacks by enforcing the regulations of the New York State law that requires that all owned dogs be licensed. Therefore, the DOHMH is conducting a survey of dog owners throughout New York City. The goal is to determine what strategies are needed to achieve maximal compliance (i.e., as close to 100% as possible) of dog licensing.

However, this has proven challenging because some dog owners lack an incentive to pay the dog license fees and to renew their licenses thereafter. So, to help show the value of dog licensing, the DOHMH has recently designed a highly valuable program that will re-unite lost dogs with their owners for free—providing the dogs are licensed. But more incentives are needed. And so we need your help!

INTERNSHIP RESPONSIBILITIES

For the Dog Licensing Survey Project, the VPCS is seeking enthusiastic interns to conduct the following:

- 1. Help design effective surveys
- 2. Recruit dog owners
- 3. Conduct in-person interviews using the designed survey
- 4. Manage collected survey results data
- 5. Perform data analysis of survey results

- The desire or ability to analyze data sets and draw conclusions (or receptive to learning/assisting)
