A peer-reviewed electronic journal, <u>PCD</u> was established to provide a forum for researchers and practitioners in chronic disease prevention and health promotion. The journal is published weekly by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's National Center for Chronic Disease Prevention and Health Promotion.

Submission Requirements:

PCD uses <u>PCD Manuscript Central</u> for manuscript submission and tracking. Before you submit your manuscript, read the instructions below **in addition to** the information provided on <u>manuscript requirements</u>.

- Participants must be undergraduate or graduate students.
- Participants must prepare a cover letter, indicating where they are enrolled and the name of their major advisor.
- Participants should address all required disclosures in the cover letter. Visit <u>How to Submit a Manuscript</u> to learn more about cover letter requirements.
- Participants must provide a letter from their advisor confirming their enrollment.
- Participants should submit the cover letter and advisor letter when they submit the manuscript.
- Manuscripts should not be published previously or submitted elsewhere for publication.
- Papers must represent original research submitted in Original Research format. Other article
 types will not be considered. For a detailed explanation, see types of articles.

Deadline:

Papers must be received electronically no later than 5:00 PM EST on January 23, 2014.

Award:

• The winning manuscript will be recognized on the *PCD* website and will be published in a 2014 *PCD* release.
