What is PALS?

- Assist with creating animated videos and gifs using GoAnimate software to enhance written content on the PALS website.
- Communicate team feedback about website design to the consulting team that manages website development.
- Maintain content on PALS website and General Internal Medicine YouTube Channel.

Qualifications:

Must be a senior in college or a post bac/graduate student. Must have strong literature research and writing skills, and must be able to take direction and feedback. Must be available to volunteer for at least 15 hours a week for a period of 3 months, and can be considered for temporary employment upon a successful performance during the volunteer experience.

Benefits:

Research hours for resume, exposure to real problem solving in the healthcare field, and possible letter of recommendation. Previous interns of this program have been accepted to medical school.

Requirements:

Instead of a cover letter, please include with your resume a brief (2 paragraph) response to the question below. Please use *primary sources* for your information and cite them appropriately. Good search tools include PubMed, Google Scholar, the CDC, and your school's library database. Applications citing Wikipedia will be discarded.
